The themes of perseverance and transcendence found in much of Steinbeck's work arose naturally from his upbringing and education. Raised in the Episcopal Church, he was steeped in the philosophy of Protestant ethics that centralizes the personal journey of humans from original sin through sacrifice to salvation. Many of his stories follow this very arc, and in so doing explore the deepest questions of human nature. Why do we behave the way we do, caught between our weaknesses and strengths? When we falter, how do we recover our grace? For Steinbeck, this was the very essence of being human: We are challenged by the world, and though we may fail, we all have the capacity to be exceptional. Here are 7 of 13 quotes from Steinbeck's books, speeches, & other writings that explore his ideas on life, literature, and hope:

I am impelled, not to squeak like a grateful and apologetic mouse, but to roar like a lion out of pride in my profession.

Nobel Prize acceptance speech, 1962
Try to understand men. If you understand each other, you will be kind to each other. Knowing a man well never leads to hate and almost always leads to love.

— *Journal entry, 1938*

I have come to believe that a great teacher is a great artist and that there are as few as there are any other great artists. Teaching might even be the greatest of the arts since the medium is the human mind and spirit.— “On Teaching”
No man really knows about other human beings. The best he can do is to suppose that they are like himself. — “The Winter of Our Discontent”
And now that you don't have to be perfect, you can be good.
